1. LATEST NEWS

Status of UNDG ITF

As of 31 March 2011, the UNDG Iraq Trust Fund (UNDG ITF) portfolio stands at US\$1.43 billion based on total donor commitments of US\$1.36 billion and US\$74 million in Fund and Agency level interest earnings.

As of 31 December 2010, the unspent balance of \$4.77 million was comprised of \$3.18 million in interest and \$1.59 million in returned unspent balances from Participating UN Organizations following financial closure of projects. For updated information and data visit the MDTF Office GATEWAY.

During the Tenth International Reconstruction Fund Facility of Iraq (IRFFI) Donor Committee meeting that took place in Baghdad on the 6 December 2010, a decision on the use of interest that accrues on the balance of UNDG ITF, both at the fund and agency level, as well as balances that

may possibly remain on completion of approved projects was taken.

With two exceptions, the donors agreed to "allocate any remaining balances of the UNDG ITF funds as of the 30 June 2010, and subsequent returns of unspent and

interest funds, to the new Iraq UNDAF Trust Fund."

The decision was taken in accordance with the provisions of section VIII paragraph 4 of the UNDG ITF Letter of Agreement (LOA) signed with donors that-states; "Any balance remaining in the UNDG ITF Account or in the individual Participating UN Organizations' separate ledger accounts established pursuant to the Terms of Reference shall be used for a purpose mutually agreed upon by the Participating UN Organizations, the Administrative Agent, the donors and the Trust Fund Steering Committee."

In 2008, the UNDG LOA was replaced with the Standard Administrative Arrangement (SAA) and the above text was modified to include the addition of "...for purpose mutually agreed upon or returned to the donors in proportion to their contribution to the Fund".

Of the total un-allocated balances remaining with the UNDG ITF account as of 31 December 2010, \$2.1 million will be returned to the European Commission and \$35,017 to Germany whose internal rules and procedures do not permit the transfer of contributions. The remaining balance of \$2.6 million, from the contributions of 23 donors, was transferred to the new Iraq UNDAF Trust Fund. Subsequent accrual of interest and return funds will be transferred following the same procedures on a regular basis. The transferred funds to the Iraq UNDAF Trust Fund will be used to support priority UNDAF programming where gaps in available resources exist.

UNOPS supports civil society in local emergency preparedness



The integration of civil society into emergency response structures has been improved in six governorates of Iraq. In February, a 12 month UNOPS project to support the inclusion of civil society in local emergency preparedness structures ended with Iraqi authorities and their NGO partners positively assessing their newly developed cooperation.

"Throughout the process, we have seen how the Governorate Emergency Cells in charge of local emergency coordination have opened their eyes to the benefits of involving civil society in emergency preparedness. With improved relations and information sharing, local response to emergencies will be both quicker and more comprehensive" says UNOPS Programme Manager for Civil Society, Mr. Adam Styp-Rekowski.

Following training on Disaster Risk Reduction and Coordination Mechanisms for NGOs and representatives of Governorate Emergency Cells (GECs) from the governorates of Diyala, Dahuk, Ninewa, Missan, ThiQar and Wassit, local NGOs were empowered to set up and run projects to strengthen emergency coordination amongst governorate state and non-state actors. Activities included organisations of trainings, campaigns, and workshops targeting local citizens and authorities alike, as well as the production of posters, booklets and radio programmes on the role of civil society in emergency response.

Commenting on the process, Riyadh Hussin Ali from the NGO Al-Erada Organization for Aid and Development in Diyala said that civil society cooperation with the Governorate Emergency Cell in Diyala had improved. "One of the significant achievements of this project is that I know that if a humanitarian disaster occurred tomorrow, the GEC would call me to consult and to coordinate the response."

From the side of local authorities, Niyaz Bamarny, Liaison Officer for the GEC in Dohuk echoes the sentiment: "Before the project, stakeholders thought that the GECs were meant to work only for the authorities. Now everyone understands that GECs' role is to coordinate work of various parties including authorities and NGOs."

The project is a key component of a wider programme implemented by UNOPS to support civil society in becoming a viable partner in the development of Iraq. Emergency response is one of many examples of where civil society can ease the work of the authorities and enhance services available to citizens.

On the national level, Dr Samir Raouf, Senior Deputy Minister of Science and Technology and Head of the National Governmental Committee noted with satisfaction that "the project activities complemented the plans on the federal level and that the implementation of emergency strategies must be broken down to the local level to be effective."



Following a lessons learned conference in Erbil in February, organized by UNOPS in cooperation with the NGO Coordination Committee for Iraq (NCCI), and the Danish Refugee Council (DRC), the participants in the project believe that the relations and cooperation mechanisms established will continue to be developed and benefit citizens in the six governorates. Participants included local NGOs and GECs in the six governorates, the Ministry of Science and Technology, representatives of the United Nations, International Organization for Migration (IOM), the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies, the Iraqi Red Crescent Society and Civil Defense from Ninewa.

UN-HABITAT and WHO Supporting Capacity Development

UN-HABITAT Organizes Land Management Study Tour to Berlin

UN-HABITAT Iraq Programme facilitated a study visit to Berlin and Potsdam from 28 February to 5 March 2011 to learn from the German experience in land management and transition towards decentralization.

The study was attended by an Iraqi delegation headed by Dr. Thamir Al-Ghadban, Chairman of the Task Force for Economic Reform at the Prime Minister's Advisory Commission, FAO and the World Bank. The study visit concluded in a statement indicating the Government of Iraq's commitment to initiate a land policy process which will act as a framework to address land management and land administration issues in Iraq.

The statement will be shortly submitted to the Iraq Council of Ministers for endorsement. UN-HABITAT will support the Government of Iraq in preparing a detailed work program for the policy, and will support the establishment of institutional arrangements and legislation as needed.

The Land Policy will contribute to economic development, poverty reduction and good governance in line with the National Development Plan (2010-2014), Poverty Reduction Strategy, and National Housing Policy, while supporting investment in Iraq.

WHO Supports Building Capacities in Medical Services

A two-week training course on Medical Equipment Management (also known as clinical equipment management) was conducted in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia from 24 January to 4 February 2011.

The training provided an invaluable opportunity for one Director General from the Department of Health Qadissiya, Assistant Director General of the Department of Health Kerbala and eight senior engineers from Departments of Health in Anbar, Kerbala, Qadissiya, Salah Al-Din, Sulaymaniyah and Thi-Qar to build their skills and raise awareness on the importance of Medical Equipment Management. The training provided them with an in-depth understanding of good practice management concepts, policies and standards pertaining to management of medical equipment.

The training was part of the UNDG ITF project D2-29 on support to improving management and safe use of medical equipment. The project aims to assist the Ministry of Health to promote sustainable changes and improvements of health care services and enhances the quality of health interventions by focusing on building a coherent medical equipment management system guided by sound policies and good management practices as well as improving institutional skills and capabilities.



Medical Equipment Management is a fundamental part of managing a clinical/biomedical engineering department. It includes the business processes used in interaction and oversight of the medical equipment involved in the diagnosis, treatment and monitoring of patients. The related policies and procedures govern activities from the selection and acquisition through to the incoming inspection, acceptance, maintenance, and eventual retirement and disposal of medical equipment.

UNESCO Launches distance Learning in Iraq: 21st Century Tools to Improve Access to Education for Iraqi School Children



Satellite television (TV) and an online educational resource are two new tools supporting education in Iraq. UNESCO, with the support of the European Union and in cooperation with the Ministry of Education, announced the formal opening of the Iraqi Educational Television and the Iraqi Curricula Website (www.iraqicurricula.org) at a ceremony in Baghdad on 23 February, 2011.

"What makes our present era remarkable are the number, variety and importance of communication and technology breakthroughs, which benefit from previous experiences and contributed to the continued advancement and development of tools to transfer knowledge " Minister of Education Dr. Mohammad Ali Tamim said in his speech.


Within the Ministry of Education's Educational TV Programming, UNESCO established two TV production / broadcasting studios with a satellite transmission unit, produced 624 TV lessons, provided a total of 725 hours of externally produced TV programs for Iraqi students and produced 24 episodes of Abu Salam Family, an animated series focusing attention on civic values, gender equality and human rights. In addition, UNESCO established a TV library and trained all the TV station staff each in his own specialty.

The Iraqi Curricula Website is an online resource with links and educational materials relevant to covering primary to secondary school. Among the features of the website are resources for literacy and accelerated learning for students who have missed school and need to catch-up, along with teacher guidebooks and educational TV programs, including the Abu Salam Family series.

"Combined, the website and Educational TV, give Iraqi school children, no matter where they are, an opportunity to learn. This is a commitment to learning for children of Iraq and an investment in Iraq's future," said Mahamad Djelid, Director of the UNESCO Iraq Office.

Since 2003, Iraq has struggled to resuscitate the education sector after years of neglect. "This commitment to education is about making a down payment on tomorrow," stressed Jerzy Skuratowiicz, Deputy Special Representative of the Secretary General of the United Nations, adding, "the progression is simple: education leads to opportunity, opportunity leads to progress, and progress leads to a brighter future for Iraq and the region."


UNESCO, along with UNICEF, UN-Habitat, the World Bank and its Iraqi counterparts, has worked diligently to restore the reputation of the educational system that was once the most respected in the Arab world. These two resources immediately address the needs of students who have been unable to regularly attend class due to war or insecurity. The satellite TV programs have a regional footprint and through the internet, all Iraqis no matter where they live, can access educational material and programs from a computer.




"The new Iraq Educational TV Programme will make the official curriculum available to anyone with access to television, which is almost 90 percent of the population in Iraq and even more in the Diaspora," emphasized Jobst Kirchmann, Head of Cooperation for the European Union.

3. PROJECT COMMITMENTS & DISBURSEMENTS

Implementing UN Organizations to date have legally committed \$1.12 billion and disbursed \$1.08 billion of total approved funding (which amounts to \$1.34 billion for the implementation of 274 individual projects and joint programmes). Tables 3.1 and 3.2 provide a summary of project commitments and disbursements by Sector and Participating UN Organization, respectively. Figures for the period ending 31 March 2011 are based on the latest available information received from the operational units of the Participating UN Organizations and provide informal financial updates. As of 31 March 2011, the average commitment and disbursement rates amount to 83% and 80% of approved funding, respectively.
